OIL & GAS PIPELINE COMMITTEE

PAUL MCMAHAN

Types of Oil and Gas Pipelines

- 1. Gathering pipelines used to deliver the oil or gas product from the source wells to the processing plants or storage facilities. They are usually shorter and smaller than other lines.
- 2. Transmission pipelines used to transport product long distances across states, countries, continents. Often operate at high pressures and are large in diameter.
- 3. Distribution pipelines used to deliver gas to neighborhoods and businesses. They are stepped down to lower pressures and sizes.
- 4. Flowlines are used at the oilfield to transmit raw products to a single wellhead. Relatively small and may contain mixtures of oil, gas, water, sand, etc.
- 5. Feeder pipelines used to transmit processed product from the facilities and storage tanks to the transmission pipelines. Typically smaller lines.

UNIQUE APPRAISAL CHALLENGES IN ASHEVILLE'S RIVER ARTS DISTRICT

I had the pleasure of presenting at the Winter Seminar in Durham on a property in the Asheville River Arts district know as the Foundation Walls. This property is now known the world over for its amazing graffiti and murals, but when I showed up to appraise it, no one outside Asheville knew about it, especially not the lender who engaged me, and yes, the property was going into foreclosure. My presentation covered many of the appraisal issues that came up; however, of most interest was the role the RADTIP played in making the property enough of a destination to warrant keeping the buildings versus demolishing them. Paul McMahan was gracious enough to talk about the RADTIP project, which had some rather outlandish relocations. Finally, the old maxim, you learn by teaching, came true for me...again. This time, in the course of preparing for this presentation, I learned about the Visual Artists Rights Act of 1990 (VARA), which gave artists moral rights to works they sell. There have been several landmark cases in which property owners had to pay restitution to graffiti artists and muralists for destroying their work. My presentation is on the Chapter 31 Forum on the IRWA's Member Network, but is comprised mostly of pictures of beautiful artwork. CONDEMNATION IN NORTH CAROLINA: DOT, GOVERNMENT, AND UTILITIES

His presentation focused on who can condemn and why, and provided nuts and bolts information about how various companies and government authorities condemn property. Michael's presentation reviewed the constitutional limitations on condemnation, including the requirements that the property acquired be put to a public use or benefit. Michael's presentation also explained how various condemning authorities, such as NCDOT, local governments, and public utilities, use the legal system to acquire property by eminent domain, including the average length of time each case takes.

Michael Crook and Anthony Alderman, both members of Chapter 31, presented at the Winter Seminar in Durham, NC. 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
